Personal, Social and Health Education (PSHE) is a planned subject taught weekly throughout Primary School. It is a subject that helps children shape their future and gives them opportunities to develop into thoughtful, informed and respectful citizens.

PSHE is taught at Christ Church Primary school from FS2 to Year 6, teaching is linked to all areas of the curriculum and it is a National Statutory Requirement that PSHE is taught in all Primary Schools.

Part of PSHE is Relationship and Sex Education. Highlighted in this document is how this area of the PSHE curriculum will be taught in an age appropriate way.

PSHE is a subject that helps children understand their choices and to explore their role within their family, school, community and the world. The teaching of PSHE gives opportunities for children to discuss how they feel and how they can best deal with everyday events and challenges in a positive and respectful way. **PSHE** is taught from FS2 to Year 6, teaching staff use a whole school overview to support their teaching, ensuring progression of knowledge and skills. **PSHE** is split into **Health, Relationships and Sex Education** and is part of everything we do such as problem solving, collaboration, reflection, resilience and perseverance. It also underpins our developing relationships, respect for others and the care we not only show ourselves but to all around us. PSHE is taught once a week in all age groups.

What are the different elements of PSHE and how are they taught at Christ Church?

We have spent a long time researching different schemes that meet our pupils' needs and maintain the Christian approach to teaching that our school is based upon. We have selected the following resources to support our delivery of PSHE & RSE:

- ***Goodness & Mercy***
- ***Go Givers***
- ***Christopher Winter's***

The **British Values** are democracy, the rule of law, individual liberty, and mutual respect for and tolerance of those with different faiths and beliefs and for those without faith. They help everyone to be aware of their rights and responsibilities to make a happy, safe and secure environment to live and work. They also help children to learn about their place in society and how our country operates.

We follow Chester Diocese syllabus for **Religious Education**. As a church school we support the spiritual, moral, social and cultural development of our school community. There are many interlinking elements with PSHE and our chosen schemes support **SMSC** so that teaching is driven by our school motto adapted from Philippians 4:13: **Together we can do all things through Christ who strengthens us.**

RSE or **Relationship and Sex Education** is taught so that children can learn how to be safe online, understand their growing bodies and learn to form healthy, loving relationships in an age appropriate way.

In an ever changing world RSE has never been so important, it gives children the tools to make positive choices and know when and how to look after themselves. We understand that parents will be interested to know about the content of the teaching within this area. The overview of the areas that will be taught and the resources that will support this are outlined below. A lot of our RSE content is linked to the teaching of Science and the relationship content is linked to our Christian ethos. The teaching of RSE is done carefully and appropriately at Christ Church, staff use resources that are supportive of our Christian Values whilst driving our duty of care to all children entrusted to us. We have selected year group texts to prompt open discussion and contexts for children to learn from. We use Goodness and Mercy and the Christopher Winter's resources to embed our RSE teaching.

Our Governors and church representatives as well as Chester Diocese are familiar with these resources and have questioned and challenged approaches to result in effective resources that aid teachers to plan well thought out lessons that have impact and engage children in a meaningful way.
